

Chaplain's Report

Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ

An old-timer in a café began talking to a Brazilian pilot who stopped in. They soon discovered they were from the same province. Next they discovered they were from the same town. When the Brazilian pilot was about to leave the old-timer said to him jokingly, "You know, if we keep talking, we might discover that we're from the same family."

That story can be an introduction to the Eucharist. For the Eucharist is a meal at which we discover, in a special way, that we are a family. We discover that we are brothers and sisters: members of the Body of Christ. Christ is always revealing himself where he has concealed himself. He is within any one who eats the brad from heaven. He is in what looks like bread and wine but what we know is his Body and Blood (reveal/conceal).

St. Paul says of the Eucharist: "Because the loaf of bread is one, we, though many are one body, for we partake in the one loaf." Today's feast celebrates the great gift Jesus made to his disciples at the Last Supper. Luke describes it this way, "This is my body, which will be given for you; do this in memory of me." "This cup is the new covenant in my blood, which will be shed for you."

These words "given for you" and "shed for you," speak of sacrifice, the very sacrifice of Jesus body and blood for us on the Cross. St. Paul speaking of this sacrificial aspect said, "The cup of blessing that we bless, is it not a participation in the blood of Christ? The bread that we break, is it not a participation in the body of Christ?"

Each time we celebrate the Eucharist together, we participate in Jesus' offering of himself to his Father. In other words, the Eucharistic meal that we celebrate each Sunday is not a new sacrifice. It is the very same sacrifice that Jesus began at the Last Supper and completed on the Cross. Where Jesus is concealed he reveals himself through the Ultimate Sacramental Sign, His Body and Blood.

Do we acknowledge Jesus Christ where he is concealed in the Eucharist? In spite of the miracles by which Jesus manifested his divine power during his public life, many people were unable to recognize him. In Gethsemane and in his Passion his divinity seemed totally hidden. Jesus hides again in the Blessed Eucharist under the appearances of bread and wine so that our faith and our love may seek him out.

The Incarnate Word (Wisdom) is there in the Host, just as he was in the times of the Apostles and of the crowds who followed him and were fed by him. The grace that flows out of the Eucharist ask for nothing but to flow into men and women to transform them into himself. By doing so he incorporates us into one family, brothers and sisters, in the Body of Christ.

Jesus said, 'For my flesh is food indeed, and my blood is drink indeed. He who eats my flesh and drinks my blood abides in me, and I in him (Jn 6:48-59)." When Jesus said this the Jews murmured. Jesus could have said that he only meant it as a metaphor, but he did not. When many disciples left him he did not call them back by correcting himself. Jesus let them go. They could not fathom that God could be revealed in a man, let alone in the form of bread.

Pope Benedict in 2007 spoke to the Bishops of Latin America and the Caribbean while in Brazil, one of his topics was Sunday Mass (The Eucharist). "Christians should beware that they are not following a character from past history but the living Christ, present in the today and now of their lives. He is the living one who walks alongside us, revealing to us the meaning of events, of suffering and death, of rejoicing and feasting, entering our homes and remaining there, feeding us with the bread that gives life. For this reason Sunday Mass must be the center of Christian life. The encounter with Christ in the Eucharist calls forth a commitment to evangelization and an impulse toward solidarity (one family); it awakens in the Christian a strong desire to proclaim the Gospel and to bear witness to it in the world so as to build a more just and humane society."

From the Eucharist in the course of the centuries an immense wealth of charity has sprung forth of sharing difficulties of others, of love of justice. Only from the Eucharist will the civilization of love spring forth that will transform Latin America, the Caribbean, and the world."

Do we believe that Jesus Christ reveals himself where he seems concealed (hidden)?


